Philemon's Pickle in the New World

The next period experiences not only the rise of slavery, but the rise of powerful abolitionists. The explosion of slavery took place in the New World not Europe, because the New World colonies were the economic engines of the European countries. The colonies provided furs, food, and cash crops like sugar, cotton, and indigo to the government agencies in Europe. Slavery was good for business. By 1750 there were 118,000 slaves in Jamaica, 500,000 in Brazil, 450,000 in the Non-Spanish Caribbean Islands, and 185,000 in the colonies of Virginia, Maryland, and South Carolina.

Around the time that Thomas Jefferson was waging war with the Barbary Pirates my great great grandfather, John Fowler, found himself in Philemon's Pickle. His father died leaving his mother to provide for John and his five siblings. It was an impossible situation. His mother convinced the authorities she could care for the girls, but the boys were taken away. One was taken by a family, but John was taken by a slave owner. He soon found himself wearing rags and sleeping on the ground with the rest of the slaves. When he realized that the slave owner's intention was to keep him as long as possible, he pulled an Onesimus and ran away.

Back in England a powerful abolitionist, William Wilberforce, worked tirelessly for twenty years to get the Slave Trade Act passed by Parliament in 1807. The bill virtually ended the slave trade between Africa and the Americas. His efforts against slavery ended with the Slavery Abolition Act in 1833. He died three days after the legislation was signed.

A few years later in the United States the issue of slavery was raging. Though the slave trade from Africa had ended the slave populations had continued to grow. Countries in the Americas had bulging populations of slaves. The United States had 4,000,000

slaves, <u>but the largest slave population was in Brazil which had</u> <u>4,500,000 slaves</u>.

Government sanctioned slavey ended in the United States with the Emancipation Proclamation in 1863 and the 13th Amendment in 1865 at the end of the Civil War.

Modern slavery as defined by the U. S. State Department is forced labor, debt bondage, domestic servitude, forced child labor, and sex trafficking. It is not perceived insults, or slights. It is not being born in or living in an economically distressed, depressed neighborhood.

Slavery is alive and well today. Though formally outlawed by the United Nations in 1949, it is practiced openly throughout Africa and Asia. North Korea is the worst with 10% of its population enslaved. Most of the nations with the highest percentage of slaves in 2018 were Muslim. That same year it was reported that China had a work force of 3,800,000 slaves used in construction and manufacturing. This is the reason for China's climb to an economic power. Imagine what the United States could produce if it had 3,800,000 slave laborers that were unpaid. No labor costs! News agencies around the world started reporting on July 16, 2021, that the Taliban were demanding lists of girls over fifteen and widows under forty-five from authorities in newly conquered lands. The women would be converted to Islam and married to Taliban or Jihadi fighters without consent. Finally, the Global Slavery Index in 2018 reported that in the United States there were over four hundred thousand people living in conditions of modern slavery.

A missionary at Kumba, in the Cameroon, was explaining to her class the western custom of giving gifts at Christmas. She summed it up by saying that Christmas gifts were an expression of joy to God and love for our friends because of the coming of Jesus into this world

A few days later on Christmas morning, a boy brought the missionary a beautiful sea shell as a present. The teacher was amazed and asked him where he got such a lovely shell. He replied, at the seashore.

"But," she said, "that is 30 miles away."

The young boy replied, "Long journey part of gift."

On a CRF trip, I went to a very remote area of Guatemala where Mayan peoples lived. It was a long trip. We ran out of roads, so we had to 4 wheel it there. Finally, we couldn't go any further in our vehicle and had to swim across a river to arrive at our destination.
