## Reflections on Slavery

We have traced slavery from the Old Testament days, through the time of Christ, into the Middle Ages, and into modern times. Here are some final observations about the blight on humanity called slavery.

Slavery and its impact are a flash point today. The impression one gets from many in our country is that it started when white slavers captured Africans and shipped them to the English Colonies in America. Nothing could be further from the truth. Slavery had been established in most cultures four thousand years ago. It was primarily used for criminals, prisoners of war, and debtors. The result of being a slave was loss of freedom. As slavery evolved forced labor and sex were added as reasons for slavery. Today slavery is alive and well. In 2018 North Korea had 2,500,000 slaves. That year China was reported as having 3,800,000 slaves. Afghanistan had 740,000 slaves. I could go on but the list of nations with legal slavery is too long. Even the United States, where slavery is outlawed, there were 400,000 people living in conditions of modern slavery.

Second, the slavery issue is race. Throughout history slavery has traversed all racial and cultural barriers. The first means of gaining slaves was conquering the neighboring countries. So, the Assyrians captured the Northern Kingdom of Israel, and its citizens became slaves. When Rome was in power their slaves came from Germany, Spain, Greece, Palestine, and North Africa. When the Islamic nations started flexing their muscle, they enslaved millions of Europeans. In one respect Christian and Islamic nations were similar. They both frowned on having slaves that were members of the accepted state religion. Later Muslim and European slave traders discovered a new source of slaves. It was Africa. African slavery was thousands of years old. The reasons were the same as anywhere else in the ancient world and the main means of acquiring slaves was warfare. But at this point in history African tribes like the Ashanti and Yoruba became involved in the slave trade by encouraging intertribal warfare. Consequently, by the 16<sup>th</sup> century in the parts of Europe where slavery was allowed most slaves were black. Some would have us believe that when slaves were transported to the English Colonies it was racial: a crime committed by one race upon another. This is in fact false. There

were many black slaveowners in the United States. John Hope Franklin, an African American historian, admitted that some free Black people used slaves to enhance their economic status. In 1830 there were 3,776 free black slave owners in the United States. Some owned one and others owned between twenty and eighty. That the number of white slaveowners dwarfs that of the free black slave owners does not nullify the following truth. When any one of any race steals the freedom of another human being for economic gain it is a sin against God.

The last thing is that governments and institutions are either unwilling or incapable of stopping slavery. For a civil government to act decisively against slavery requires overwhelming public support and a powerful spokesman. William Wilberforce, and Abraham Lincoln are 19<sup>th</sup> century examples of individuals who brought about positive changes. The 20<sup>th</sup> century's only achievement was when the United Nations created an International Day for the Abolition of Slavery in 1949. Today the U. N. estimates there are forty million people in slavery. Whether it is a government or a religious organization they have for four thousand years bowed to the desires and threats of the economically powerful to bend laws, morality, and ethical behavior for economic gain.

In the scripture God allows slavery, but I wonder if he allowed it for the same reasons, he allowed divorce. People have hard hearts, but in the beginning it was not so (Matt. 19:8). You get a glimpse of what God thought about slavery when he told the Israelites not to return an escaped slave to his master (Deut. 23:15-16). In the New Testament Paul puts pressure on Philemon to free Onesimus (Philemon 8). Finally, he tells slaves that if they could gain their freedom do it (1 Corinthians 7:21-23). God desires physical freedom for all, but his major concern by far is to give both slave and free alike spiritual freedom.

**Colossians 3:15-16**15 Let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, since as members of one body you were called to peace. And be thankful. 16 Let the message of Christ dwell among you richly as you teach and admonish one another with all wisdom through psalms, hymns, and songs from the Spirit, singing to God with gratitude in your hearts.
